Our vision is to become a leading facilitator in the relationship between the EU and the UK and to be the voice for business - advocating for frictionless trade, market access and economic security.

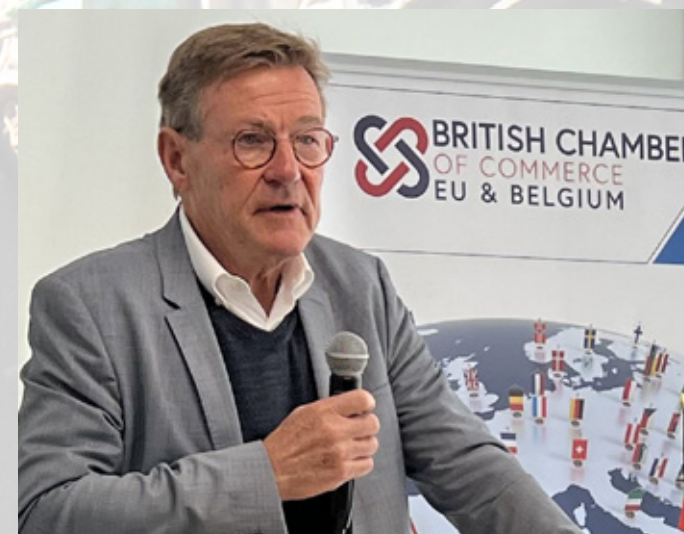

BritCham EU advocates for closer cooperation on EU-UK common strategic objectives and the continued strengthening of the relationship.

BritCham Belgium - provides an essential network for UK and Belgium businesses and stakeholders as well as connectivity to regional and national agencies, consulates and embassies. BritCham Belgium further supports bilateral and international trade and investment through the British Chambers of Commerce Global Business Network.



02 BritCham EU



Our Strategic Priorities

BritCham EU is the pillar of the British Chamber of Commerce EU & Belgium that focusses on all matters concerning EU policy and the relationship between the UK and the EU. We promote the importance of fair and open business in Europe and our aim is to help influence policies which facilitate and support businesses both in the EU and in the UK to thrive and succeed in this context. The key to the value that BritCham EU brings to its members is delivered through the various activities and events originated by our committees and/or through our strategic partnerships.

The European Union and the United Kingdom share common aims in defence & security, net zero goals, economic security & competitiveness, and data & technology. The British Chamber of Commerce EU & Belgium advocates for EU and UK policymakers to work towards specific agreements in these areas of strategic common interest. Whilst the Trade and Cooperation Agreement (TCA) sets out a framework for an EU-UK economic relationship, it does not provide sufficient reach in these critical areas.



Our Key Areas of Focus

DEFENCE & SECURITY

In view of the current geopolitical climate, BritCham EU warmly welcomes the new strategic EU-UK Security and Defence Partnership, announced at the EU-UK Summit in May 2025, covering commitments on security, defence and development cooperation. It is necessary that policymakers focus on maintaining a relationship that strengthens both EU and UK industries and economies, and answers the ongoing demands of shared security. As stated in the Chamber's European Defence Industry Report, it is paramount that both the EU and the UK work towards a policy framework which enables their respective defence sectors to cooperate closely with each other.

NET ZERO

The EU and the UK share common objectives on climate action and energy security, building on the commitments made at COP28 and the shared ambition to transition their economies to net zero greenhouse gas emissions by 2050. However, the TCA does not provide sufficient support for effective cooperation towards meeting net zero targets or the associated Green Industrial Transition. This is why BritCham EU calls on the EU and the UK to engage in a Green Economy Partnership as outlined in our published report, that will provide the framework for achieving these common strategic objectives.

ECONOMIC SECURITY & COMPETITIVENESS

Rising protectionism and challenging trade environments in the changing geopolitical landscapes have led to increased disruption in global supply chains and exposure, in turn leading to increased European vulnerability. Ensuring Europe's ambitions for increased resilience and working towards European Economic Security and Competitiveness are the only way to bolster growth and competitiveness. By identifying ways of unlocking opportunities between the EU and the UK, we look to facilitate conversations and policy action through our report to this challenging landscape.

DATA & TECHNOLOGY

As the digital revolution is reshaping economies and societies in a global geopolitical landscape which is more challenging than ever, BritCham EU supports enhanced digital cooperation between the EU and the UK in the 2026 review of the Trade and Cooperation Agreement (TCA). Minimising regulatory divergences in artificial intelligence (AI), data protection, and other relevant areas is key to reducing potential trade frictions and boosting bilateral trade and economic growth on both sides of the Channel. BritCham advocates deeper cooperation and coordination to support a competitive data and technology agenda.



Advocacy

Serving the interests of our international business membership, BritCham EU advocates for the strongest possible relationship between the EU and the UK.

Our advocacy work is directed by the board of directors which reviews the Chamber's strategic priorities on an annual basis and decides where the Chamber focuses its resources for the coming 12 months.

Our activities are driven through our committees, policy council and secretariat and governed by the leadership of the Policy Council which approves all position papers and strategic communications.

Policy Council

The Policy Council plays a crucial role in shaping and guiding the organisation's policy agenda. It is made up from the chairs of the EU Committees and the Policy Council Leadership.

The Policy Council Leadership reviews the annual programme proposals from each committee to ensure they align with the Chamber's strategic objectives. This process ensures that the committees' work is fully cohesive in supporting the broader Chamber goals and the operational activities of the secretariat.

Our Positions



EUROPEAN ECONOMIC SECURITY & COMPETITIVENESS

This report initiative was launched by BritCham EU to bring together European industry stakeholders to explore the mutual opportunities that exist between the EU and the UK to ensure European Economic Security & Competitiveness (EES&C).

In the context of shifting geopolitical and trade conditions, we look to encourage deeper economic cooperation and strategic partnership between the EU and the UK and to find solutions to reduce evolving risks and challenges. The EES&C programme covers 4 pillars; Geopolitical Dynamics, Supply Chain Resilience, Cyber & Technology Security and European Competitiveness.

THE EUROPEAN DEFENCE INDUSTRY REPORT

This report was published following a European-wide call for evidence from the defence industry with over 400 companies involved. The report covers a wide range of issues, from industrial competitiveness, the participation of UK companies in the EU defence initiatives, tackling the topic of employment and skills in the sector, critical supply chains and wider strategic issues, calling for untethered European industrial cooperation.

The report summarised 8 key recommendations to accelerate industrial cooperation and to maximise European security perspectives, highlighting topical issues for the EU and UK government in the lead-up to the EU-UK Summit in May 2025 and beyond.

EU-UK GREEN ECONOMY PARTNERSHIP

This initiative was launched to highlight the urgent need for dialogue on a European industrial cooperation framework working towards achieving the Green Industrial Transition and the shared 2050 Net Zero ambitions of the EU and the UK.

A series of workshops and engagement with over 70 members and industry stakeholders culminated in a report with actionable policy recommendations and ambitions across 5 key pillars: Energy, Transport, Carbon Markets, Capital Markets and Research & Innovation.

MANAGING CHEMICALS DIVERGENCE POST-BREXIT

This position paper highlights the urgent need to manage regulatory divergence between the EU and UK chemical regimes, particularly in relation to REACH. It calls for maximising the use of the Trade and Cooperation Agreement (TCA) provisions to protect integrated value chains and facilitate trade. Moreover, it also advocates for ongoing dialogue between regulators and industry to ensure legal clarity, support strategic technologies, and assess alternatives robustly.

The aim is to balance environmental and health goals with maintaining the competitiveness and resilience of the EU-UK economy, while avoiding unnecessary regulatory burdens and safeguarding close economic ties.

EU Committees & Working Groups

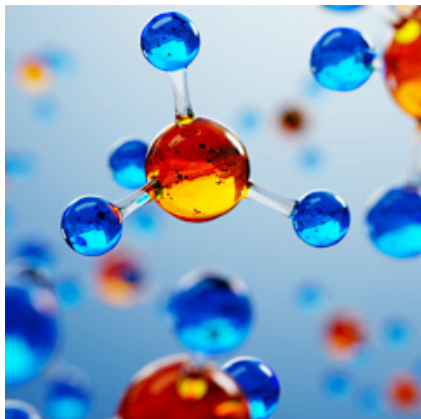
The driving force behind developing our members' interests, our committees are completely open and inclusive offering opportunities for individual members to be active in our work and to genuinely make a difference.

BritCham EU committees and working groups cover a wide range of sectoral interests in the context of EU policy and EU-UK relations. Committees work independently on an annual work programme which is produced by the co-chairs and approved by the Policy Council Leadership.

Committees generally meet 6 times per annum to continually develop the programme, organise events and update on policy issues. Our committees are formed with two co-chairs who stand for election every two years providing the opportunity for individuals from the wider membership to take a leadership role.

Meetings can be in person or hybrid, hosted at BritCham's offices or at the offices of one of our members, the key being to maximise participation for our members, many of which are not based in Brussels. Committees often bring in guest speakers from the EU institutions or UK Government for policy updates and briefings.





CHEMICALS WORKING GROUP

The Chemicals Working Group explores, through regular meetings, the evolving regulatory landscape for chemicals in the EU and UK, with a focus on the upcoming REACH revision and related legislative changes. These meetings provide a forum for expert-led discussions, information exchange, and best practice sharing, enabling participants to stay informed and address the challenges and opportunities arising from new regulations.

Policy focus areas include:

- EU REACH revision: Assessment of regulatory needs, restrictions, and their impact on chemicals regulation.
- Chemical legislation for specific product areas: Ongoing challenges in areas such as biocides.
- UK REACH and regulatory divergence: The UK's development of its own framework for managing chemical substances, including PFAS.



COMPETITION COMMITTEE

The Competition Committee explores, through regular committee meetings, expert-led discussions and networking events, pan-European regulatory themes that are relevant to EU, UK and global operators, with a focus on competition. The Competition Committee provides a forum for members to actively engage in meetings, events and discussions in order to gain access to valuable information, collaborate with peers and stay up to date about legal matters.

Policy focus areas are decided by the committee and include:

- Antitrust
- Merger Control
- Subsidy control and State aid
- International digital markets and services (Digital Markets Act and Digital Services Act)

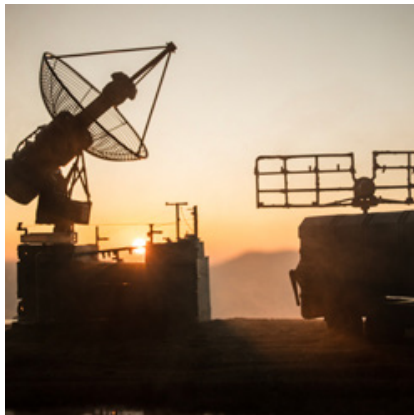


DIGITAL COMMITTEE

The Digital Committee strives to play an active role in the digital policymaking debate taking place in Brussels, the UK and globally. The Committee aims to help businesses navigate this complex and rapidly evolving digital environment and seize the new opportunities that will arise from the digital transformation. This is achieved through engaging with legislators on upcoming policy developments that affects the digital sector through events and discussions.

Policy focus areas are decided by the committee and include:

- EU & UK Digital regulatory convergence and divergence
- Artificial Intelligence
- Cyber Security
- Digital Partnership Agreements



DEFENCE & SECURITY COMMITTEE

The Defence & Security Committee is a unique platform for international industry officials, business and policy makers to discuss the ever-evolving challenges and opportunities of the defence industry in both the EU and the UK. It focuses on key policies in all operational areas, including land, sea and air capabilities, Artificial Intelligence, procurement, cooperation initiatives, as well as hybrid threats and cyber security. This Committee provides input and creates dialogue around defence and security areas, bringing key stakeholders together to solve complex situations.

Policy focus areas are decided during regular Committee meetings. The current focus of the Committee is on:

- Driving European industrial cooperation
- European defence initiatives and programmes, and their cross-border collaboration
- Closer EU-UK industrial and security arrangements



EU-UK RELATIONS COMMITTEE

Following the EU-UK Summit in 2025 with the new UK government and Commission, the EU-UK Relations committee will be focussed on political and policy engagement, to adapt and contribute to the re-navigation of EU-UK relations. Connecting with stakeholders on both sides such as the Parliamentary Partnership Assembly, Commission, MEPs and MPs, the Committee is dedicated to being the platform for communication, engagement and knowledge for all stakeholders in EU-UK relations. We seek to rebuild relations from both sides of the channel by collaborating with key decision makers within the EU and UK parliaments, by highlighting key policies brought to us by our members that may need reform in order to provide the best possible outcome for both EU and UK businesses.

FINANCIAL SERVICES COMMITTEE

The Committee monitors policy developments in key financial areas on both sides of the Channel, engaging with stakeholders in both the EU and the UK. It focuses on cooperation and regulation within the UK-EU financial sector, serving as a platform for debate and collaboration. The Committee offers members a regular forum to engage in discussions, events, and advocacy by bringing together key stakeholders, policymakers, and business leaders to exchange views and build relationships.

Policy focus areas are decided by the committee and include:

- EU & UK financial regulatory convergence and divergence
- Sustainable Finance
- Savings and Investment Union (SIU)
- Digitalisation, crypto regulation & anti-money laundering (AML)



HEALTHCARE COMMITTEE

The Committee contributes to legislative and policy discussions through regular events as well as serving to maintain relationships between businesses and decision makers. It acts as a platform for knowledge exchange and collaboration, aiding businesses in navigating the EU and UK healthcare landscape .

Policy focus areas are decided by the committee and include:

- Critical Medicines Act
- European Biotech Act
- Pandemic Preparedness
- EU Life Science Strategy



SUSTAINABILITY COMMITTEE

The Sustainability Committee covers policy developments in all areas of sustainability, encompassing the environment, the economy, and society. The Committee supports the exchange of best practice and facilitates dialogue between EU and UK policy experts and business leaders.

Key policy focus areas include:

- Packaging and Packaging Waste: Advancing policies and practices to reduce waste and promote sustainable packaging solutions.
- Circular Economy: Supporting legislative and business initiatives that encourage resource efficiency and waste reduction.
- Taxonomy: Monitoring and contributing to the development of sustainable finance and investment frameworks.
- Green Transition: Promoting policies that accelerate the shift to a low-carbon, sustainable economy, including cooperation between the EU and UK to achieve net zero goals



TRADE POLICY COMMITTEE

The Trade Policy Committee is engaged on all aspects of trade, including Free Trade Agreements, customs procedures, rules of origin, SPS and discussions in international organisations, for example in the WTO and the WCO.

The Trade Policy Committee monitors, analyses, and discusses developments affecting EU/UK, UK/rest of world and EU/rest of world trade providing insights on issues such as the EU Customs Code reform, the UK accession to the CPTPP, the European Commission's proposal on anti-coercion, the UK's bilateral FTAs, WTO Ministerial meetings, and the EU agenda for FTAs.

03 BritCham Belgium



BritCham Belgium is the pillar of the British Chamber of Commerce EU & Belgium that focusses on bilateral relations, business, trade and investment between the UK and Belgium

Established in 1910, this part of the Chamber has been a pivotal factor in UK – BE relations working closely with the business community, bilateral embassies, the UK Department of Business and Trade (DBT), and local government agencies.

More than 400 British companies have a commercial presence in Belgium and the UK is consistently a top 5 investor in the Country. Belgium is the UK's 8th largest trading partner, and the 7th largest export and import market.

WORKING IN BELGIUM COMMITTEE

The Working in Belgium Committee features a diverse group of member experts from various industry sectors. This enriching and rewarding environment provides a platform for knowledge sharing and to harness and foster expertise within the membership. With coordination meetings, we discuss developments in the Belgian market and the UK-Belgium bilateral relationship. We encourage new ideas to shape the work and event program of the Chamber and continuously identify opportunities for businesses to better navigate and thrive in the Belgian market.

- Collaborating with the three Belgian regional trade, investment and export agencies
- Tax, Finance and Legal Sessions and Webinars



ESG WORKING GROUP

The ESG Working Group aims to ‘*make sustainability happen for your organisation*’ by supporting strategy across environmental, social, and governance (ESG) areas. It facilitates best practice exchange and dialogue among British, Belgian, and European business leaders.

Key policy focus areas include:

- Environmental sustainability
- Social responsibility
- Governance and compliance
- Cross-border cooperation

The Group provides a collaborative platform for sharing knowledge and practical ESG approaches, helping businesses navigate complex regulations and drive positive change.



TRADE FACILITATION COMMITTEE

The Trade Facilitation Committee provides a platform for all relevant businesses and stakeholders engaged in the facilitation of trade between the UK and Belgium and those looking to invest in Belgium. The Committee monitors, analyses and discusses developments in the trading relationship between the UK and Belgium and provides network, outreach and connectivity to businesses engaged in bi-lateral trade.

The Committee works with the three Belgian regional trade, investment and export agencies to give practical advice to those looking to trade between the United Kingdom and Belgium.

04 Events & Delegations

BritCham organises a variety of events throughout the year and are a key area of interest and engagement for our members.

Events are often driven through our committees and thus cover a wide range of interests, sectors and policy areas but there are also a number of events aligned with and supporting the Chamber's strategic priorities and initiatives as well as flagship events and delegations.

Whilst events are generally only open to BritCham members, we actively encourage a wider audience to our networking events and broader initiatives where we look to bring in industry engagement and expertise from outside of the membership.

High-level guest speakers feature regularly and add significant value to the richness of our events for participating members where they stay informed about the latest developments in their industries, build valuable relationships, and enhance their professional skills and knowledge.

Sponsorship

Many of our events and visits are available for sponsorship where members use the opportunity to align their businesses with a specific policy matter or to support one of the Chamber's key initiatives.

Sponsorship packages can be individually tailored to specific requirements and can range from supporting a committee-generated event or to create an event initiated independently by one of our members.

This black-tie event includes a formal dinner, VIP guest speakers and entertainment, providing a festive atmosphere to reflect on the year's achievements and build new connections.

The Spring Networking Cocktail offers a relaxed setting for members to meet new contacts and strengthen existing relationships.

Generally held in May, this informal gathering encourages conversation, collaboration and the fostering of productive partnerships within the business community.

Each year, we organise a visit to Strasbourg, offering members the chance to engage directly with members and policymakers from the European institutions.

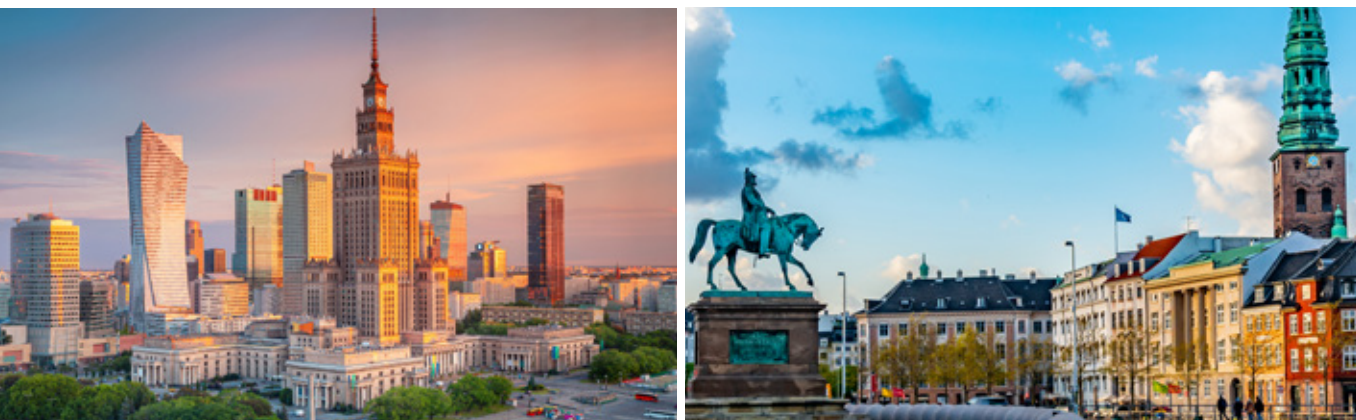
This trip provides valuable insights into EU operations and facilitates dialogue on important sectoral issues affecting our members.



EU COUNCIL PRESIDENCY VISITS

BritCham organises a 2-day delegation to the capital city of the country next to take the bi-annual presidency of the Council of the EU.

Visiting 3-6 months ahead of the accession, the delegation meets with ministers and government officials to discuss policy areas identified as priorities to the forthcoming presidency.



VISIT TO WESTMINSTER

Our annual visit to Westminster provides members with a fascinating insight into the UK's political landscape.

This visit includes meetings with members of the House of Commons and House of Lords to discuss pressing matters relating to the UK's relationship with the EU. Delegates are able to converse with key policymakers and put across their views and positions.



Committee & Member Events



The majority of BritCham events are produced and developed across and within our extensive committee programme. Generally focussed on sectoral policy matters, these events bring in high-level, expert speakers in a roundtable or panel discussion format.

Outside of the auspices of the committees, members are able to propose their own, sponsored events on topics or issues specific to them and their business priorities.



International Women's Day

GENDER EQUALITY - AN AGENDA FOR ALL

Our events gather professionals and policymakers for high-level discussions on the role of gender equality in today's economic and political landscape. Recent speakers have emphasised that equality is not only a moral imperative, but a strategic driver of Europe's competitiveness. Conversations have explored how to embed inclusion into leadership, tackle underrepresentation, and rethink how businesses define and measure progress.

Alongside these discussions, our initiatives also shined a spotlight on practical tools, such as career sponsorship, to accelerate women's advancement. While mentorship has long played a supportive role, we highlight the importance of structured sponsorship, where senior leaders actively advocate for emerging talent and embed equity into organisational culture.
